ENVIRONMENTAL REVOLUTION

MP hails a new generation taking control of the green agenda and broadening its appeal at last.



Steve Brine says a welcome new 'environmental revolution' is taking place as the government announces a series of hard-hitting actions to secure a greener future.

The Prime Minister recently launched a landmark 25 Year Environment Plan which sets out how the UK will improve the quality of air and water, create richer habitats for wildlife and crucially, tackle plastic in the oceans.

Steve told The Chandler's Ford Post; "Over the next quarter of a century, we will crackdown on plastics by eliminating all avoidable plastic waste. We'll be doing this by extending the very successful 5p plastic bag charge to small retailers, removing consumer single use plastics from the government estate, supporting the water industry to significantly increase water fountains and working with retailers on introducing plastic-free supermarket aisles. We will also use aid money to help developing countries.

"I know from many conversations I have had with constituents that this environmental revolution is really cutting through, especially among the younger generation. My own children tell me there will be more plastic in the oceans than fish by 2050 and, although it's impossible to ever accurately count either, they're onto this."

The government has also said it will create 500,000 hectares of new habitat for endangered species and will be seeking to create an international anti-poaching taskforce, as well as extending the UK's network of marine-protected areas.

Steve continued: "We are fully committed to delivering a Green Brexit and I am closely involved in this on the subject of air quality through my role as Public Health Minister.

"Michael Gove has made a flying start to his brief and it's good to see. It's been hard to keep pace at times but I know moves such as introducing legislation to install mandatory CCTV in all slaughterhouses was also a very popular move locally."

NEWS IN BRIEF



REPRESENTING THE UK

Health Ministers from the G7 met in Milan last year and the Chandler's Ford MP was there representing the UK.

The agenda covered climate variability and its impact on human health, women's and adolescent's health as well as anti-microbial resistance.

Speaking in the final session of the event, Steve Brine criticised the US administration for pulling out of the Paris Climate Change Agreement and spoke about strong action the UK Government is taking to tackle air pollution. He also stressed the importance of women in the developing world having access to the same high quality family planning and sexual health services enjoyed in the UK.

READING FIGURES TRANSFORMED

Steve Brine has welcomed the announcement that reforms to the national curriculum have seen the best reading standards in England for over 15 years.

In 2010 the government announced that all schools would be required to use phonics to teach children to read. Since then, England has risen to joint 8th in the world for reading standards, improving the reading level of pupils from all backgrounds.

This follows official statistics which show all children in the Winchester & Chandler's Ford constituency are now attending schools rated 'good' or 'outstanding'.

OSBORNE SCHOOL WW1 AWARD

Two students from Osborne School in Winchester were invited to the House of Lords before Christmas to receive a special prize for their First World War legacy project.

Jack Dunford and Ben Morgan, both Year 10 students at the maintained special school, were recognised for putting together one of the six best legacy projects in the country, following their participation in the First World War Centenary Battlefield Tours Programme.

Steve Brine was there to hand out the award and said: "Their film is a brilliant example of the way in which students can share their educational experiences with one another, as well as with the wider community in Winchester. Well done Osborne!"

FOCUS ON CANCER

Chandler's Ford MP Steve Brine, who was recently reappointed as the Public Health Minister, has welcomed news that cancer survival rates in England are at an all-time high and continue to improve.

And he recently took part in an evidence session on progress being made to deliver the 95 recommendations in the Cancer Strategy for England by 2020.

Over 80 organisations and individuals submitted written evidence to the enquiry, and the session focused on workforce, funding, governance and accountability, early diagnosis and overall delivery of the strategy.

Steve also hosts a regular cancer 'roundtable' at the Department of Health where he invites representatives from cancer charities across the country to work as key members of the team to drive better outcomes.

He says; "Record survival rates are great but we know there's much more to do. The overwhelming majority of cancer patients are being seen and treated promptly against a backdrop of more people being diagnosed than ever before which is why I obsess about early diagnosis. For almost all cancers it is this which will save lives."

The MP also visited The Christie in Manchester last year, the largest single site cancer centre in Europe to see development of the National Proton Beam Centre. It is due to open in August 2018 and will be the first such centre in the UK; currently patients are forced to travel to the United States.

IT STARTS WITH ME

Steve Brine visited the Terrence Higgins Trust back in November to mark HIV Self-Testing week.

The Health Minister, and our local MP, discussed a range of topics with people who are living with HIV and inspirational charity Chief Executive Ian Green.

They also discussed PrEP, a drug currently being trialled by the NHS which prevents the virus being passed on. Also on the agenda was the stigma of living with the condition, particularly amongst the older service-users who were diagnosed in the 1980s when AIDS was seen as a death sentence.

FUTURE OF DIABETES

Steve Brine launched the Future of Diabetes report recently at a special event in Westminster.

The report follows one of the largest engagement studies ever undertaken by the main charity in this area, Diabetes UK.

The scale of the challenge means that new ways to support people living with the condition need to be found, and their report identifies six themes ranging from getting the right support from health and care services, support with the emotional aspects of diabetes, access to information, treatment and technology plus support at work or school.

EASTLEIGH LOCAL PLAN 'MESS'

Eastleigh Borough Council is still without an adopted Local Plan for housing, infrastructure and employment space. This failure, as the local planning authority, means that local residents don't have the certainty of knowing where development can and cannot take place.

Cllr Judith Grajewski said: "Yes, the borough needs more housing but the council should be working with local residents and co-operating with neighbouring authorities to ensure that the right homes are built in the right places whilst protecting our environmental assets, heritage and communities."

"The Council is pressing ahead with plans for 5,200 new homes north of Bishopstoke despite the massive negative impact this will have on ancient woodlands, the South Downs National Park and the internationally renowned and protected River Itchen SAC (Special Area of Conservation). An, as yet unfunded, bypass is also planned to bring traffic from this new development through Allbrook toward Junction 12 of the M3.

"Eastleigh's flawed draft plans aim to deliver 729 new homes each year for the next 20 years which would create 2,000 more homes than the borough actually needs."

Steve Brine said: "I'm extremely concerned by the way Eastleigh is preparing its Local Plan in isolation from its neighbours in Winchester District and Chandler's Ford, and without listening to its own residents. Eastleigh has doggedly pursued this large development north of Bishopstoke to the exclusion of other available sites in the borough which should have been evaluated in as much depth rather than being dismissed early in the planning process."

"Eastleigh's MP shares my concerns along with the Meon Valley MP whose

constituents will also be affected by Eastleigh's proposals."

Cllr Judith Grajewski added: "The sheer volume of traffic which the new bypass will bring to the M3 will put intolerable pressure on Junction 12 and local roads in Chandler's Ford".

COUNCIL HOMES TO DOUBLE BY 2020

Conservative-run Winchester City Council has announced plans to double the amount of council homes built by 2020. This means that the Council's existing target of delivering 300 new council homes by 2020, is now more than 600.

The council has identified sites for council housing from across the district for schemes of varying size. The schemes will provide homes for older people and families, and the ambitious plans also aim to provide for young people who want to take their first steps onto the housing ladder.

Steve Brine has spoken out on the subject of Boomtown Fair, the popular music and arts festival hosted each Summer at the Matterley Bowl near Winchester.



BODYCOATS ROAD UPDATE

In September 2017, county councillor Judith Grajewski organised a meeting for local stakeholders and county council officers to discuss road safety in Bodycoats Road near Toynbee School. The area can become quite crowded with traffic and school pupils, some of whom have visual impairment and attend the special unit at Toynbee. The meeting was positive and constructive.

As a result, a range of action points was drawn up and the County Council's internal engineering consultancy was commissioned to produce a draft scheme to improve safety for children crossing at this location. A concept design is currently the subject of an early stage road safety audit.

Steve Brine says: "This site is not without its constraints so I'm pleased that Hampshire County Council is thoroughly looking at how to improve crossing facilities adjacent to the school".
